


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# The Deeper Meaning Of Liff: A Dictionary Of Things There Aren't Any Words For Yet--But There Ought To Be

Douglas Adams was the bestselling author of many works including The Hitchhikerâ <sup>TM</sup>s Guide to the Galaxy, which was turned into a major motion picture. He died in 2001. John Lloyd is (he says) Britainâ <sup>TM</sup>s most successful television comedy producer since Chaucer and is responsible for Not the Nine Oâ <sup>TM</sup>Clock News, Spitting Image, and Blackadder, among others.

A hugely funny and original idea, wittily expressed, that makes me cry with laughter. I particularly

love the definitions that apply to the place of my birth, Sutton and Cheam. I don't think "genius" is too extreme for the quality of this work: the apex of British humour and Weltanschauung. Don't be scared by that earnest endorsement ... it is just that I sense that the concept and its realization appeal to a particular set of sensibilities, and my English friends and relations love it while some more solemn friends do not, alas, get it. I know that I will treasure this book and return to it often. It is very dippable-into - but on the other hand, I find once I look, I can't stop reading "just one more".

I've had many copies of this book on and off, and when I lost it in a move i had to have it again. An excellent bathroom or coffee table book, good for quite a few laughs, unless you're the kind of person who doesn't like to laugh. Then it may be an exercise in masochism.

This book is a delight to keep or to give. The only note of caution I would add is to avoid reading The Deeper Meaning of Liff in a public place where snickering, chuckling and guffawing might embarrass you.

I have to qualify the 5 star rating. This is not a book you read cover to cover. Rather it is best enjoyed in small doses. Also if you are unfamiliar with Douglas Adams I would suggest starting with the Hitchhiker's Guide. However if you are a die hard fan and just can't get enough silliness then this is a good one to get.

His novels are better but they would be - they're novels. This is funny and a quick read. As a bonus, you can read bite sized chunks.
