

The end of the American Revolution in 1783 confirmed the independence of the republic of the United States of America from Great Britain. Britain, however, still managed to make its presence felt in North America. Britain's Orders in Council concerning trade were a major irritant which, added to other issues including the sale of Louisiana and the impressment of American soldiers by the Royal Navy, finally caused the United States to declare war on 19 June 1812. This volume examines in detail the organisation, tactics and equipment of the British forces between 1793 and 1815.

Packed with specially commissioned artwork, maps and diagrams, the Men-at-Arms series is an unrivalled illustrated reference on the history, organisation, uniforms and equipment of the world's military forces, past and present.

The Napoleonic Wars placed enormous demands on Great Britain's limited Army. One of the places that went short were Britain's holdings in North America. This older Osprey Men-at-Arms Series book describes the hodge-podge collection of regulars, colonial units, fencibles and militia units that defended Upper and Lower Canada, the Canadian Maritimes, and Newfoundland during the period. In a very concise 48 pages, veteran historian Rene Chartrand lists the units, along with some details on their service and their uniforms. The subject is perhaps too large for such a compact volume, but there are some interesting details here for the general reader and the student, such as the difficulties of outfitting units with proper uniforms for the climate. The color plates of examples of uniforms by Gerry Embleton are first rate. Dated but recommended.

Was hoping to find some reference to blacks that served with british forces during the war of 1812, didn't have a single reference to the blacks who served as british colonial marines formed by Admiral Cockburn. These men fought for promised emancipation and in so doing had a part in the burning Washington, D.C. Disappointed that they were not mentioned or had a picture of them but not surprised that blacks were not mentioned in the book, rarely are african americans or minorities given credit for their contributions
