A great story of self discovery, this book teaches many great one-liners of wisdom, especially about strength, weakness, and perspective, although the main character points them out a little too obviously at times. Tradition melds well with a few classic tropes, but the good character development is what brings it through. I'm glad there were no characters I hated; although I was afraid of that toward the beginning I was pleasantly surprised when it turned out that I even liked the demon, and it proves everyone has a story. It definitely kept me guessing at times, especially the first half of the book, even if there were a few really obvious things too. All in all, an easy, enjoyable read and thought provoking too. Sora is the princess of the Kami. A race of spirits, who are given the duty to protect the land and people of Japan. The palace at Mt Fuji is attacked and Sora discovers that she is a human, who was switched at birth to protect the real princess. Her guardian, and friend Takeo is tasked to take Sora to safety. They are to seek out the Kami seer, and follow the prophecy. They must journey to find and train the real princess, for only she can drive out the evil who have enslaved the Kami in Mt Fuji. I enjoyed this book. The writing and dialog are good. The characters are well developed, and the world is unique. I recommend checking it out!

Yes, she struggles, but only because she is trying to find where she fits as the truth is revealed. She's an excellent problem-solver, and she learns quickly to trust her foremost feelings. People talk about epic tales, but until you read a story such as this, then you do not understand the importance of the story being told. In the words of the author "The knowledge that strengths could be weaknesses, and weaknesses strengths", allows us to understand the message this story sets to send. The story is Japanese in origin, using the kami, or spirits of natural things to maintain the balance of the wind water earth and fire. When a demonic occupation of the kami palace occurs, it throws everything off kilter. The prophecy had been made and appeared that it would now be fulfilled. The daughter of the ruling kami, along with the three sacred items, would save them all. However, as with all good stories, there are some surprises along the way. I hate spoiling a good yarn, so I recommend you read it for yourself. I have to advise that I was given a copy of this book, in exchange for an honest review. This was a fun, easy read. Sora, the main character, has to come to terms with who she is and accept her place in the world. The story was fun and different from anything I've read before, a new take on the Kami (or gods) of Japan. Even though the story was set in Japan and was supposed to be about Japanese Kami, I sort of felt that it could have taken place anywhere in the world. If I hadn't known so much about Japan and visited twice myself, I don't know that I would have been able to envision some of the settings of the story, there wasn't enough description to allow someone with no knowledge of Japan to see the setting. I don't agree with the decision that Sora makes at the end, but then, I'm not her. However, it was nice to see that the author wasn't just glorifying the Kami in the book, it took all types of beings and ways of thinking to defeat the enemy.

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
