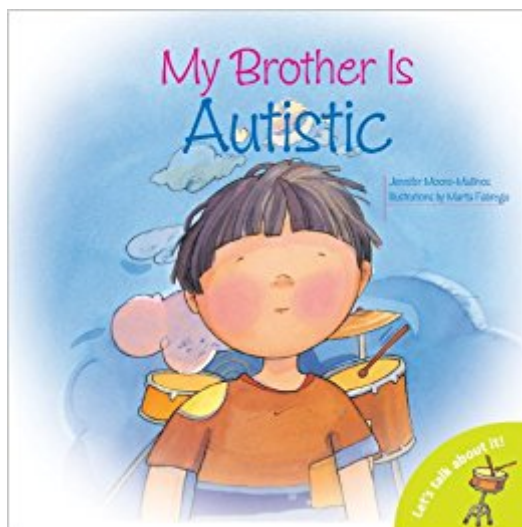

I bought this for my 6 yr old after my 4 yr old was diagnosed. I was hoping that it would help him to understand what is going on with his brother and maybe with relating to how he may be feeling. I like the concept of this book but I feel like it could have done so much more to talk about autism. Even for a small child it did very little for helping them learn about autism and how it affects siblings. We did also buy "I See Things Differently: A First Look at Autism" which was more informative but we are still on the hunt for more and better books
