

Synopsis

This beautifully written and engaging survey offers an up-to-date New Testament introduction for undergraduate students and general readers. Powell presents disputed and controversial issues fairly, neither dictating conclusions nor privileging skepticism over faith-based perspectives. The book is written in a lively and engaging style and includes helpful sidebars, maps, tables, charts, glossary, diagrams, and suggestions for further reading. In addition, this full-color book includes beautiful artwork illustrating the reception of the New Testament through various times and cultures. A companion Web site through Baker Academic's Textbook eSources features a video introduction from the author and a wealth of additional resources for students and instructors. Resources for students include introductory videos, chapter summaries, chapter objectives, study questions, flash cards, extra sidebars and charts, self quizzes, and bibliographies. Resources for professors include discussion prompts, pedagogical suggestions, PowerPoint outlines, and a test/quiz bank.

Mark Allan Powell (PhD, Union Theological Seminary, Richmond) is the Robert and Phyllis Leatherman Professor of New Testament at Trinity Lutheran Seminary in Columbus, Ohio. He is the general editor of the HarperCollins Bible Dictionary as well as the author of numerous articles and books. Powell has also served as the chair of the SBL Historical Jesus Section and is the former New Testament editor of the SBL Academia Biblica dissertation series.

We used this book as a supplement to a graduate level NT class. Powell does a wonderful job of presenting both conservative and liberal points of view on issues in the NT, without his own prejudices creeping in. His information is well-researched and accurate. Each chapter gives a quick overview of a NT book, background/history of the author and time, and presents the major themes found in the NT book. Powell's writing style is fluid and approachable, which makes the book a joy to read (yes... even for a 'textbook'). Readers of all backgrounds and education levels will get much from this read. Highly recommend.

I am a now-retired pastor with an academic background who teaches in a lay-training program for our Lutheran synod. I ordered this as a possible text to use for a New Testament class. It took only a short time to decide that I needed to look no farther: this is the text I will use. Among its features:--A reasonable price for a quality hardback, especially in comparison to other NT Intros (a significant matter with lay volunteer students)-- Many maps and pictures--always a plus in my mind-- Especially laudable is access that is given to a website with a plethora of materials from background information to time-lines to lists and explanations of names (or terms or coins) to descriptions of topics (e.g., Jewish religious 'parties' or popular Greco-Roman philosophical 'schools') to extensive and wide-ranging bibliographies for each chapter, any or all of which the user can download for his/her notebook for personal use, or print for a Sunday-School or adult class he or she may be teaching in his/her own congregation.-- As the author points out, the chapters of the book can be used in the order they come, or they can be shuffled around to use in a different order (as I intend to do). Each chapter can stand on its own, and does not assume that the reader has already dealt with the previous chapter(s). This means, of course, that there is some repetition here and there, but it's not burdensome, and sometimes repetition brings a topic back to mind.-- The author states in his introduction that there is often a wide variety of views on just about any New Testament topic (take authorship of virtually any book, for example); he says he intends to offer the arguments of the major 'sides,' but unlike what other NT Intros often do, he does not then push his own opinion on the reader, but may note where the majority seems to stand and let the teacher and/or student make their own decisions. He is very even-handed on these topics.-- The author writes in a relaxed. conversational style; reading is not a matter of plowing through a lot of dense text.-- For each NT book the author offers an introduction, a kind of precis for the book, then a discussion of major topics or concerns in the book, followed by a conclusion.-- The author reflects general 'mainstream' scholarship regarding the New Testament, and does not try to beat his own idiosyncratic drum, so this text can be used across a spectrum of denominations with adults of various ages, and probably

even with (serious) senior-high students....... All in all, an excellent resource and highly recommended.

This is a great textbook to help anyone come to a better understanding of the New Testament. My husband and I are Christian Ministry majors at a local college and this was the required text for our New Testament Literature class. We are so pleased with the layout, design and easy reading that we have decided to use it to teach our children, who are homeschooled, about the Bible (especially our son who has desired to be a minister since he was about five years old). If you want a more understanding of the New Testament, this book is the one to help you. The chapters in this book coincide with the chapters in the Bible, but the design is such that you can study in any order...just like the Bible. It would be awesome if the publisher developed an equal for the Old Testament.

Perfect for me, that is. It met my needs and expectations exactly, and I could not be more pleased with this textbook, though I bought it not as a formal student but as a lay person wanting a richer understanding of the New Testament and its parts. Powell provides helpful background and introduction to the NT as a whole, introductions to the several categories of NT literature (gospels, Paul's letters, etc.), and introductions to each book in the NT. While his background and convictions appear to be on the evangelical spectrum, his information is balanced and inclusive of a variety of scholarly opinions. Though I am a life-long student of the NT, his book has enriched my understanding greatly. I could not be more pleased.

Mark Allan Powell has produced an excellent book which anyone can understand and enjoy. He starts the book with a marvellous Preface in which he speaks to the reader directly - it is as though he is having a conversation with you. He uses simple language to get his message across which provides the book with much clarity. The maps, historical photographs and examples from the history of Christian art as well as the companion website which offers additional material for study, greatly enhances this book. As a historian and a student of Theology, another important feature of this book

is the author's ability to use simple language to explain the dynamic world of the New Testament which is critical to understanding the context in which the New Testament was written. Introduction to the New Testament is truly a beautifully written book and I recommend it to anyone who is interested in understanding the New Testament.
