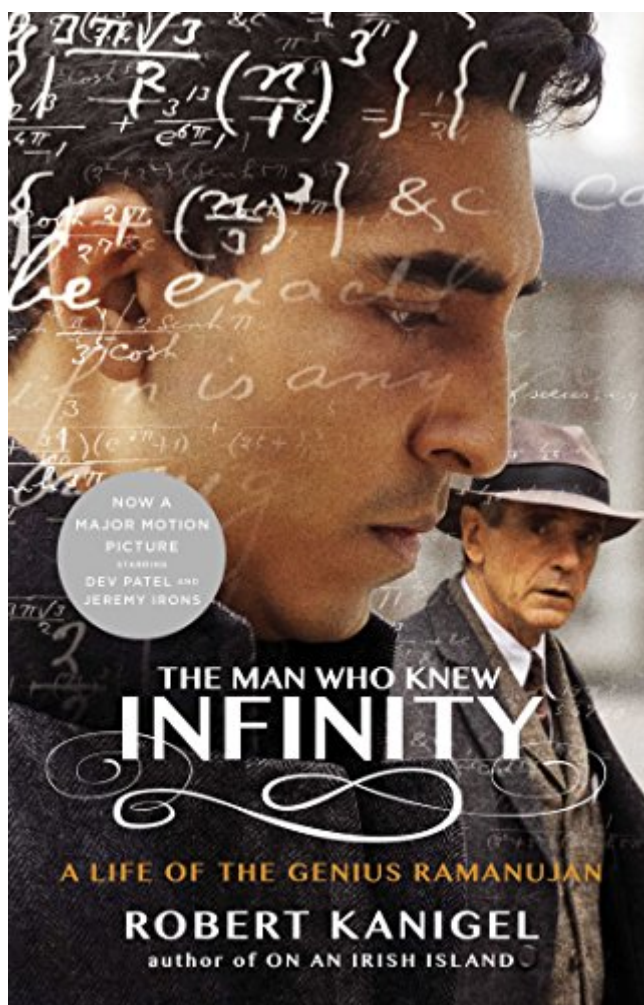

To think someone with relatively little formal learning could formulate some of the most complex mathematical computations that are still being newly understood is mind boggling. And thank goodness there was someone there to bring him to the forefront of the mathematical world.

This excellent biopic about a world class self-taught mathematician is well worth seeing. It gives insight into what awesome things some mathematicians can do, and the personal difficulties they can experience.
